

The event, titled "Stay Safe on Your Boat," was organized by NSYC's Education Chair, Laura Boehm, and featured the experienced sailor and NSYC member, **Jerry Silverman**, as the guest speaker.

Jerry, with an impressive 59 years of sailing experience on Manhasset Bay, shared his wealth of knowledge with over 40 enthusiastic NSYC members and guests. Formerly a member of the Knickerbocker Yacht Club, Jerry is now an active member of NSYC. His sailing journey includes participation in significant races such as the 1967 America's Cup, the Trans-Atlantic sailing race, TransPacific sailing race, and five Bermuda Races.




other members volunteered to work at this. Even more just decided to

Cruising Magic - Happy Dreaming (and Planning) from NSYC's Cruising Chair

Boat hauled. Winterized. Cover on. Cold days and nights are here, even if there is a teaser once in a while with some weather where the heavy sweaters and coats are not needed that day. Now what am I going to do?

The best response to that is think about all the places I went and where I want to go next season, not to mention all the things that I now know have to be done on the boat in order to have a good cruise. So here are some thoughts about cruising and planning.

One of the first things to think about is where is my "cruising grounds." Am I going to be traveling to fairly far away ports or ones that will be reachable within the limited time that most of us have to travel and visit destinations.

We are lucky to be located in Long Island Sound and some very good coastal cruising areas adjacent to the Sound because of the variety of options for cruising. Almost any cruising guide or magazine that discusses our area labels it as one of the best cruising grounds available. New England ports have long histories and generally are in the business of welcoming people coming from the water. In almost any town along the way you will find marinas, yacht clubs, shops and restaurants and some of the most beautiful scenery one could ask for. There are harbors with lots of amenities and ones that are what I call 'two block towns' where the charm of a maritime location is all wrapped up for you in two streets. There are also harbors with nothing much in them but a place to drop and anchor and enjoy the view and the best of what nature has to offer without the interference of us cohabitants. My conclusion to this part of our discussion is that in order to really do some cruising and planning, one first has to read up in the cruising guides about various places, whether online or in books and magazines to see the many choices that are before you.

Once you have done that part of the planning process, you then need to see how those options fit into your personal preferences and your particular boat. Are you set up for semi-camping and independence so as to make visiting those more natural and less inhabited areas enjoyable, or does your boat and set up and personal preferences require the amenities of docks, electricity and places to walk and visit in lovely villages in order to satiate your itch to travel? There are no right or wrong choices to be made, but understanding your preferences makes for easier planning and more enjoyable cruising.

I have found that it is best for members who want to get into cruising either as new boaters or as one who mostly or exclusively raced sailboats or even powerboats, to try to plan their initial cruises with some variety of places sort of like trying different types of food or wine until you can figure it out. Some might then go more in one direction or the other, while others will develop a balance between the options that might even vary from year-to-year or sometimes a number of times within the same season.

As mentioned before, some of the decisions will also be based on the boat you have and what it provides. That is why I used the term "camping" as some boats will give you just enough basics to go to places, but it will be more like camping as there might be limited

refrigeration, electrical power, hot and cold running water, AC, cooking options and shade for being out in the cockpit.

Having started out in daysailers and then to moderate-sized boats with some basic amenities and then my present boat, I have found that these choices of what do I really need are very personal and also change over time. Some of us can start with less to see what we like and how doable cruising is for you, and others will want to have those amenities right from the start so as to make life easier and your cruising experience better sooner rather than later. My advice to those thinking of these choices is that don't decide not to go and try a cruise just because there is a little roughing to it or that your boat might not have all those bells and whistles. There are plenty of ways to work around any perceived amenities that you don't have and places to visit that are not far away that will accommodate you and your boat in 'as is' condition.

Obviously, you still need to make sure that the basic safety needs are taken care of and that you are able to sail and motor safely and efficiently to your destination, but the accommodations part has plenty of room for making life better at all stages of budgets and experience.

This brings be to the other side of the analysis. What is my cruising range and how comfortable am I and my crew in traveling there as far as distance and timing? Besides the choices on types of places to go and the boat's accommodations and amenities, there is the core question of how patient am I and my crew for a trip of 2, 4, 6 or 8 hours or even longer? Believe me this question is probably the most important one to be considered in planning a cruise. Different tolerances for you and crew can make for very interesting

times on a small boat and how you solve them will determine how successful and enjoyable the cruise will be for all on board. Breaking your trip up into moderate distances will usually work the best even for experienced cruisers. There may be days when you do longer legs but mix those in with shorter ones or try to plan a layover day in the port you got to after a day which was longer than might be your average or usual leg. This balancing act makes the cruise work. It is also important to decide if the trip is a real cruise which implies enjoying the time on the water and in ports or if it is a 'delivery' which is all about getting from one place to the destination as soon as possible. There may be times when the latter is necessary, but I highly recommend avoiding those delivery trips as much as possible, especially in novice cruising vacations.

Of course all this discussion only becomes meaningful when set against the backdrop of having a goal of visiting beautiful places. Waking up to sun rises and enjoying you breakfast, coffee or tea in the cockpit while looking around at nature's best, or those evening sunsets that everyone seems to love to take pictures of looking at great scenery and other boats and sometimes wildlife while enjoying favorite beverages in the cockpit and then seeing stars that you forgot existed. It is magical.

So I end by asking: Do you believe in magic? Best to all for Happy Holidays and a Great New Year!

In Memoriam – Last Call Sad News at NSYC

Yehuda Rosenstock



On September 8, 2023, Past Commodore Yehuda Rosenstock passed away from brain cancer and lung, heart, and renal failure. He struggled many years with his illnesses but always displayed a positive spirit and courage.

Yehuda was born and raised in Haifa, Israel. Yehuda's love of the sea came naturally. His grandfather, who was murdered in the Holocaust, founded a magnificent yacht club on the river outside Berlin. His father became a British sea captain after having been incarcerated in several concentration camps.

Young Yehuda was active in the Haifa Sea Scouts, a movement started to instill children with marine awareness. It taught character forging, responsibility, teamwork, and commanding ability. At sixteen, he was sent as Israel's representative to the United States and Canada for a sailing regatta. While here, he was interviewed by the press and appeared on television.

Yehuda returned to the States for college after serving in the Israeli navy as head of its early warning systems. Although accepted into MIT, he pursued a degree in electrical engineering at Drexel University because at the same time he had to help care for his newborn son and work full-time.

Upon graduation, Yehuda was courted by a multitude of top engineering firms. He chose Intel, which sent him back to Israel in order to start a branch of the company there. At the time, Israel Intel had five employees. It now is Israel's largest technology employer with over 12,000 workers. Yehuda's picture still hangs on its walls as a founding father.

Yehuda left Intel to start his own company. Throughout the years he had several companies where he designed a broad array of mostly computer-embedded and robotic products. Probably his most important invention was an x-ray scanner still used by military and law enforcement agencies around the world. It has saved thousands of lives by enabling soldiers and police to check the inside of bombs without exploding them.

Yehuda was honored to be selected as a member of ASTM International, the worldwide organization that develops standards for a wide range of materials, products, systems, and services. He focused on nondestructive testing of nuclear reactors, oil pipelines, bridges, aircraft, etc.

Not only did Yehuda serve as our Commodore, but also he contributed a lot to the well-being of the Club. For example, he instituted the Moonlight Regatta, chose the beautiful upper deck railing, engineered a way to straighten the flagpole, and mentored many club sailors.

On September 17, 2023, his wife, Carol Roberts, buried his ashes at sea and hosted a memorial for him at the clubhouse that was attended by more than sixty people. They came to bid farewell to this man whom we admired for his nautical prowess and kind, generous heart.
