We are excited to have two great Laser Sailboats that are available for anyone in the club at any level of membership to sail. You can get qualified to take one out by getting checked out by our Sailing Instructor or Linda Kulla, Evan Spence, or Colin Schneider. If you want lessons, then you need to wait until the instructor arrives in June. This is a fun boat to sail, and with two in our fleet we can have some fun competition.

We also have a smaller radial rig, which is better suited to teenagers or smaller adults. Our teenage members are encouraged to get qualified to sail these exciting boats and with their parent's approval, explore the harbor.

This year we repurposed an old floating dock to be the Laser dock. You may have seen it next to the dinghy dock resembling a small golf putting green. This surface allows us to store the boats right on the float and rig and launch them directly from the float without damaging the boats or interfering with traffic on the floating docks.



Bill emphasized that racing helps improve sailing skills and expressed thanks to our PROs and Race Committee members... without them, no races.









Members may rent the Clubhouse for private events for \$250, during the off season and on weekdays during the summer season.



Robert Coles' Cautionary Sail



Spring 2022



On June 30, a raft-up below the NY Statue of Liberty brought together a dozen boats from the Corinthians Association in an effort to recruit new members who had sailed down the Hudson from Nyack, NY.

Being one of the first to arrive, I deployed my 35lbs CQR anchor and some 60 ft of 5/16" chain in some 12ft of water.

I got a bit concerned when some larger boats rafted up to my 35ft Pretorien Sojourn, especially a 48ft trawler who I requested to set up a second anchor – "Bahamian" style.

Four hours later, after disengaging the well dug anchor and stowing the anchor on its roller, I proceeded to motor back north via the East River.

Past Rikers Island jail, a large motor yacht passed me on starboard, creating the wildest chop Sojourn ever plowed through. The forward hatch was closed but unsecured and opened like a quacking duck or a whale filtering East River's critters into my V berth...

I also heard a long whimpering rogue cry, grrgrrgrr. Rapid investigation did not reveal any problem.

About five minutes later, Sojourn did not move, having lost any propulsion forward or reverse. The propeller wash showed up clearly at high RPM. I suspected having snagged a log or a drifting net. Being immobilized in the middle of the high barge traffic of the East River, I issued a PAN PAN security on Channel 16. I then called Tow Boat US, Boat US, the Coast guards, and NYC Police. Finally, Marine 4 from NYC Fire Department very kindly showed up and efficiently passed me a bridle to tow me out of the traffic lane. That is when I noticed my chain had unrolled 150ft. I had anchored in the middle of the East River! I had omitted to secure the anchor in its roller with a \$5.00 shock cord.

Again GrrrGrrrGrrr.

At last I was able to sail back to my mooring under sail and grabbed the mooring line under low RPM.

Three weeks forward... Since January, I had prepared for a long trip to Maine with the same



Corinthians Sailing Association fleet. Some 30 boats are participating and coaching a series of interesting visits. I installed a radar, AIS, new speed/depth/temperature sounder...

Ten days before the rendezvous in Rockland, Maine and two days before leaving port, I tested the engine and I noticed no propulsion. A rapid dive confirmed the fear: the chain must have snagged the propeller and unsecured the retaining nuts. I had lost the folding propeller. No replacement was available in the USA. I finally had to buy a new GORI 16" from Denmark, shipped via Paris and delivered 7 days later.

By the time I hauled out, it would have been a real day and night delivery leg from Port Washington to Maine. One of the most uneasy steps was to tell my crew – some members of the Corinthians coming from Virginia.

I finally tested the new Gori, but I immediately snagged a mooring line. In fact, this setup needs to keep the "old" zinc on the saildrive in addition to the large Gori zincs on the new propeller. The boat is being hauled again, 18 days after scheduled departure. The snagged mooring line totally tightened the propeller retaining nut...

A new zinc had to be drilled and belt sanded to fit the new propeller.

More news to follow... I sincerely pray that Neptune and Poseidon will have annihilated Medusa and other Enyo.

Strong self-deception. I hope to be able to sail to Block Island or Martha's Vineyards before the end of the season...

Moral: a \$5.00 shock cord and a Big Hopper jumping more carefully would have saved \$5K.

Final conclusion: this new propeller increased reverse maneuverability and maximum speed to 6.7 knots!

The program is very important in bringing in funds for our club, and I sincerely hope that someone, or a committee, will step forward to keep this program going.








In Memoriam – Last Call Sad News at NSYC
