



As NSYC member, Dan Herron said, "Sailboats and airplanes have a lot more in common than you may think!"







NSYC Carries 2019 Model Boat Regatta to Another Success

It was a typical Sunday in early June as 272 third graders from six (6) Port Washington schools, whooped it up and raced their own one-design boats at Port's Harborfest on Baxter's Pond.

This year, 412 third graders built model boats and 272 raced. 22 elimination heats were run and scored with precision; six school champions were crowned, the "Team Spirit Award" was awarded to the school with the highest percent of participation and the final run-off crowned the "All Port Champ" for 2019 ...all accurately and within 95 minutes!

As the case for well over a decade, much credit goes to the children and their classroom teachers, their parents, adult volunteers, 12 sponsors, police and fire departments, Nassau County and many from NSYC. The core volunteer Team from NSYC, made up of Mary Lu & Bill Palafox and Marian Weissman commenced their work in January, coordinated with schools, local agencies & sponsors, prepared boat building and racing inventory, recruited volunteers, trained trainers and children, established crowd control and race management and accurately orchestrated the complex race day, and more ...all in the spirit of recycling and promoting Port Washington's nautical heritage.

Add an AIS receiver to free chart plotting software on your notebook, phone, iPad, or tablet.

When you are on the water there is a mass of information available at your fingertips. The scope of this article is limited to Windows laptops/notebooks. However, the same information can be available on your iPhone, iPad and Android phone or tablet.

Frank LoPresti and Lloyd Herman contributed articles to the Blinker in 2015 and in 2017. This is about my experience in following their advice. Bottom line it works. Going the next step, I implemented AIS.

For about \$100 you can have a very up to date chartplotter with AIS receiver. In case you are not familiar with AIS here is the background.

AUTOMATIC IDENTIFICATION SYSTEM


An AIS receiver adds to your electronic chart display a symbol for every significant ship within radio range, each with a velocity vector (indicating speed and heading). Each ship "symbol" can reflect the actual size of the ship, with position to GPS or differential GPS accuracy. By "clicking" on a ship symbol, you can learn the ship name, course and speed, classification, call sign,

registration number, <u>MMSI</u>, and other information. Maneuvering information, closest point of approach (CPA), time to closest point of approach (TCPA) and other navigation information, more accurate and more timely than information available from an automatic radar plotting aid, can also be available. Display information previously available only to modern <u>Vessel Traffic Service</u> operations centers can now be available to every AIS user.


This is an official description of AIS; in actuality AIS transponders have become mainstream for pleasure boaters. Transponders are the "sending" component of AIS. There are several types of transponders for pleasure boats. We see AIS signals coming from boats 30' and up. There are several boats in the NSYC fleet that are equipped with transponders.

To add AIS receiver capability, I first, I downloaded to my notebook/laptop the free charts. Opencpn.org is the source see Blinker 2015 and 2017 for the complete details (old Blinkers are on the NSYC website).

I already had a GPS which connects to a USB port on the laptop (\$13 -\$39). Next I ordered a Daisy AIS receiver from wegmatt.com (\$59* including USB cable) and then added an antenna. I had a 20-year-old hand held vhf and took its antenna. It worked perfectly. Hand held VHF antennas can also be bought (\$10 -20). Please note – the Daisy unit is a receiver only – it will not broadcast your location or boat information. To do such, you need a transponder.







RETURN HOME

Wegmatt.com has the complete details to add an AIS receiver to the OpenCPN chartplotter software. Adrian at Wegmatt is very helpful and has offered a discount to NSYC members (see below).

I use my notebook at my nav station. It is now a backup system. The primary use of the notebook is remote access to my home and business workstations. If anyone is interested in seeing the AIS in action I would be glad to demo it, perhaps at one of our educational presentations.

Here are a couple of screen shots from my notebook at home; you probably will recognize some of the boats listed in the "target list" and on the chart.

The software is very powerful. I have just touched on a few of the features. Others include measuring distances, plotting courses, adding tide and current information to the display, etc.

Neill Parker's Dolcezza won Division II, PHRF Non-Spinnaker. This is Neill's account of the ALIR.

After being saluted with the spectacle of a historic fireboat's powerful sprays and nearly being t-boned by an 82-year-old 32,000-lb. wooden yawl at the start, Dolcezza and her crew of seven were off on a romping beat through NY Harbor, crossing tacks with dozens of boats on our way out of the harbor and into the open Atlantic.

As the sun set while we were off Long Beach NY, we enjoyed the first of our many extraordinary meals. With Greek (Katerina Xenos) and Italian (Giulia Alimonti) cooks aboard, we already knew that while how we would do in the sailing competition was uncertain, we would definitely have the best food in the fleet! As Thursday night wore on into Friday morning, the ever-lightening southerly made for some slow going. But watch captains Mary Ann McCruden and Michael Flynn and the rest of us diligently kept the bow pointed east as best we could, and fortunately the crew of mostly South Shore sailors enjoyed some uncharacteristically smooth seas.

Whales and dolphins were abundant throughout the day Friday. Eventually as the breeze completely died and we started drifting southwest, we dropped the anchor in about 80 feet of water. The irrepressible Myles Cunningham jumped in for a dip he said was refreshing, but we all had other thoughts a few moments after he climbed back aboard and we saw the shark. But soon the light southerly returned and we resumed our eastward journey. The southerly kept us going all the way to Montauk point, which we rounded a bit after dark in contrary current, but a freshening breeze got us around the point before it died yet again in Gardiner's Bay.

Fortunately, by the time the breeze died, the current was changing as we made our way to Plum Gut, and with Michael Flynn helming we were pulled slowly towards the Gut at 1 to 2 knots. Most of that was due to the favorable current and his familiarity with the area, gained from years of sailing out of Greenport. We made it through on the last of the positive current in the early morning Saturday, while the rest of the non-spinnaker fleet was now becalmed behind us and waiting six hours for the current to turn.

As a brisk southwesterly built upon entering Long Island Sound, Skipper Neill Parker took the helm for much of the one-tack beat westward to the finish at Sea Cliff. With the apparent wind reaching up to 23 knots, reefed main and genoa were necessary as the rest of the crew, including Angela Binetti, Giulia's lifelong friend from Rome, climbed up on the rail. 51 hours, 44 minutes, and 41 seconds after we started, we crossed the finish line to some well deserved rest.

He kept it out in Greenport, and sold it shortly before he died.

One of his favorite sailboats was the one he moored at NSYC, Whim, although for the past 2 years he was unable to sail at the club he loved so much, or to attend the interesting and entertaining lectures, as well as the fabulous parties. He missed so much. We miss you!

Stanley Rosenberg, 96, passed away 9/9/19. "Sailor Stan" is survived by wife Ruth and 2 sons, David & Marnin. Ruth quotes Stanley..."How do you stay married to the same woman for 72 years? You enjoy a glass of wine together every evening."

Stanley joined NSYC (1990), more than 30 years ago. He previously sailed a Rhodes 19 out of Stepping Stone. He was an eager Sonar racer, first #163 then upgrading to #368, called Tzuris, which actually means "trouble". But, Tzuris, brought no aggravation, just pleasure to Stanley. He was a dedicated member of the One-Design Sonar fleet. Ruth mentioned, that he never tired of driving every weekend from Manhattan to PW, to race with friends, even if the wind died.

Professionally, Stanley was a very successful architect, he graduated from Brooklyn College in 1943, then obtained a Bachelor of Architecture from Columbia University in 1952. "Sailor Stan" was truly an inspiration, and role model to all who knew him, always keeping fit with weekly exercise and swim routine, and with his zest for life and appreciation for everything beautiful. We will all miss this very sharp man and his twinkling eyes.
